St. Colman's, Cobh: This year the cathedral church of our Diocese, St. Colman's, Cobh, celebrates the centenary of its dedication. Several events are marking the commemoration, including a photographic exhibition in Cork Airport and a Solemn Mass next August 25th, the date of the original dedication in 1919. St. Colman's is a Pugin Neo Gothic architectural gem, dominating the skyline of Cobh town and Cork Harbour. Its construction took 47 years (from 1868-1915).

A visit to St. Colman's is a moving spiritual experience. The gothic grandeur of the interior, the delicate carvings, breath-taking stained glass windows, the beautiful arches and the mellow lighting combine to lift the human spirit.

The Cathedral is steeped in history and has been part of some significant tragic events since the time of its construction. It was the last landmark many of the passengers aboard the Titanic would have seen. It held the funeral cortege for the Lusitania. Some 2.5 million people emigrated from Cobh since famine times and many of them would have celebrated their last Mass in Ireland at St. Colman's Cathedral. The Carillon of 49 bells was installed in 1916; it has a total weight of over 26 tons and is the largest in Ireland & Britain. The balcony houses a Telford and Telford Pipe Organ, which has been restored in time for the centenary.

The interior walls have recently received a major cleaning and new lighting has been installed. The finely detailed stone work, carvings, mosaics are again to be admired in their original state. Each of the 46 parishes of the diocese is named in a dedicated stained glass window, including Killavullen, beneath an image of St. Nicholas. **Bon Mot:** The real measure of your wealth is how much you'd be worth if you lost all your money.
