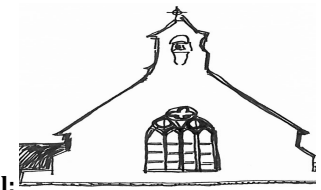

Thursday, October 31 is the feast day of **Blessed Dominic Collins:** Born in Youghal in 1566, Dominic came from one of the town's leading families; his brother and father had served as town mayor. Youghal remained loyal to Queen Elizabeth during the Desmond Rebellion of 1579 when the town was sacked. However, Protestantism was enforced in the town following the suppression of the revolt and the local Jesuit school, which Collins had attended, was closed. Dominic fled to Nantes (France), partly to escape the religious persecution and partly to pursue his chosen career with the military. He rose to the rank of officer with the Duke of Mercoer, but eventually became disillusioned with military life. He joined the Jesuits at the Irish College in Salamanca (Spain) (where, once again, Irish seminarians are studying for the priesthood). In 1601, Dominic accompanied the Spanish Armada and fled Kinsale following defeat at the hands of the English. He was captured and tortured at Dunboy Castle (Castletownbere). Refusing to renounce the Catholic faith, he was sent back to his native town to be publicly hanged on October 31, 1602. Dominic Collins was among the seventeen Irish martyrs beatified by St. Saint John Paul II on September 27, 1992.
