Second Week of Easter (April 19-25, 2020)



Second Sunday of Easter - Liturgy of the Word

First Reading: Luke's description of the "Jerusalem Spring" is an enduring vision statement for the Church of today. The ideal Christian community does four things: it remains faithful to the teaching of the apostles; it has a common life; it celebrates the "breaking of bread" (Luke's phrase for the Eucharist); it makes regular time for prayer. At the moment these activities are at a distance and through the internet - we will appreciate the support of our Church and faith community all the more when the Covid-19 crisis passes.

Responsorial Psalm: A song of thanksgiving for all that God has done in bringing his people out of slavery in Egypt (the reference to Aaron). The Hebrew word "stone" (eben) is similar to the word for "son" (ben). Christians saw in Jesus the stone / son of God rejected by the builder that became the cornerstone of a new temple.

Second Reading: The opening lines are a blessing and follow a format that was familiar to Jewish ears. The First Letter of Peter was written during the persecution of the Roman emperor Nero (65AD), hence the reference to "trials" and "testing". We are among those who have not seen Christ, but still have loved him.

Gospel: The risen Jesus was a transformed person. Otherwise, how could he suddenly "appear" in a locked room? Here, once again, the Gospel of John shows a preference for faith over physical signs (miracles) of God's presence. Thomas' profession of faith, "My Lord and my God" (v.28), is a highpoint of New Testament belief in the divinity of Jesus. But Thomas was standing before a wounded man, a reminder of the lowliness as well as the sovereignty of the Messiah. The breath of Jesus (v.22) is a symbol of his Spirit: his mission of sharing God's mercy now belongs to the Church. May each of us be a sign of God's compassion to the world.
