Feastdays this week: October 4: St Francis (118-1226) was born the son of a wealthy French cloth merchant. Francis was a soldier who liked to party, but this lifestyle left him disillusioned. He had a transformative experience in ruined church and believed that Christ spoke to him, asking him to "rebuild my Church"... not so much the building as his living body. Francis renounced his possessions and lived a life of complete simplicity and respect for creation. He promoted dialogue with Islam, and at the end of his life received the *stigmata*, the wounds of the crucified Christ, the first saint to do so in Christian history.

October 7: Our Lady of the Rosary.The Dominican Order made popular the
praying of the Rosary in the 14th Century. In 2002 Pope St John Paul added the
Luminous Mysteries of Light to the traditional Joyful, Glorious and Sorrowful
