Fourteenth Sunday

1st Reading: The Lord comforts the people of Israel like a mother consoles her children.

They are to travel lightly, unencumbered by possessions or personal concerns and are to put their trust in the kindness of strangers. This way of living is, at once, simple and respectful, but also radical and courageous.

Notes on Parish History II (notes by Nora Moroney NT) From the arrival of the Anglo-Norman knight Sir David Nagle to Killossan (now, Killisane) in 1358 to the departure of Pierce Nagle from Annakisha North, 500 years later, the Nagles provided continuity and stability to this area, in times of both war and peace. Being Catholic made the local branch of the family more acceptable to the ordinary folk than other members of the landlord class.

During the draconian Penal Laws (1695-1829) the Nagles built a private chapel next to their demesne at Annakisha. It was a thatched structure, measuring 30 x 8 metres. Over time, the people of the surrounding area began to attend Sunday Mass at the chapel. It was not capable of accommodating the crowd, so the people gathered outside and stood or they sat on three legged stools or knelt on small sacks of straw which they brought to Mass. This practice continued until the present church at Annakisha was opened on June 30, 1861.

A stone with an inscription requesting prayers for the repose of the souls of the Nagle Family was removed from the old chapel and is now at the bottom left-hand corner of the present Annakisha Church. Joseph Nagle of Annakisha (1656-1757), was the uncle and benefactor of Venerable Nano Nagle. In 2018, as part of the celebrations to mark the tercentenary of Nano Nagle an old iron gate was removed from the demesne at Annakisha to Nano Nagle Birthplace, Ballygriffin and erected in memory of the Annakisha branch of the family.
