<u>Twenty Fourth Sunday</u>

Christ who welcomes sinners.

1st Reading: Soon after they have been liberated from slavery in Egypt, Moses climbs mount Sinai to receive the Ten Commandments. On his return, he finds that the people are worshipping a golden calf. They had turned against God, but Moses intercedes on their behalf.

 2^{nd} Reading: For St Paul, Jesus Christ is the greatest sign of God's mercy. By sending us his Son, God reached out to humanity in its troubled state. *Gospel:* The three parables in the long version of today's Gospel, the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the lost child (the prodigal son) all propose an image of God as one who waits for us or who seeks us out when we lose our way: "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in You." (St Augustine +430)

Altar-servers 2022-2023: Permission forms becoming an altar-server this year are available in the sacristy. Being an altar-server is a privilege and a commitment that builds our faith in God and our relationship with the Church. Notes on Parish History VI (by Nora Moroney): Fr John Kepple (born 1750; died, April 20,1849), was the parish priest of this area from circa, 1800-May 30, 1814 (or, 1820?). A native of Carrig, he was responsible for the building of the first parochial house at Ballygriffin, circa 1805. He was buried in the north-west corner of Clenor cemetery. Like many of those buried at Clenor, his resting place is not marked with a headstone.

It is planned to erect a simple memorial at the grave of this notable figure in parish history in the coming weeks.
