1st Reading: The prophet Elisha heals Naaman, a gentile, of his leprosy, the dreaded skin disease of the ancient world. His healing brings Naaman to belief in the one true God.

 2^{nd} Reading: Paul writes to Timothy from his prison cell in Rome. He can bear his sufferings with patience and hope because of his faith in Christ. Gospel: Jesus' reputation as the Messiah grew from events like the healing of the ten lepers. But this healing miracle also serves to make a wider point: that we can all too easily take the gift of life and health for granted. It was a Samaritan, a gentile, who might be regarded as the least deserving of help, who alone returned to give thanks for the gift of salvation.

Koinōnia: Adult Faith, Fellowship and Formation in the Diocese of Clovne: This week a new two-year course in theology and pastoral ministry will begin at Nano Nagle Birthplace. Reena O'Sullivan and Mary Fitzgerald will begin the course from our parish. We wish them every success.

Notes on Parish History X (by Nora Moroney). Annakisha Church (Completed 1861): The reredos (the large installation behind the altar) was constructed in Milan from Canadian Pine. It was shipped to Limerick for installation in the new Redemptorist Church of St Alphonsus, but was found to be unsuitable. Fr Greene became aware of this fact and purchased it for his new church at Annakisha. (A physical confirmation of this fact was discovered when the wall behind the reredos was replastered in 2018: The original doors into the sacristy had been sealed up. New doorways were installed to meet the alignment of the reredos). It is said that the roof of the church had to be raised to accommodate the extraordinary height of the piece. Its transportation from Limerick took a cooperative effort: On the appointed day, twenty hoses and six carts set out for Limerick via Ardpatrick, Kilmallock, Bruff. The horses, carts and men were provided by Laurence McCarthy of Castlekevin, George O'Sullivan of Powerstown House and Jeremiah O'Farrell of Clenor.
