Jesus is that long-awaited "wondercounsellor" and "prince of peace" whose kingdom invites our response. 2^{nd} Reading: The glory of God has been revealed in Jesus Christ. His coming among us brings the opportunity to renew our lives according to his light. *Gospel:* Two very different accounts of the origins of Jesus. On Christmas Eve, Luke's reflects on the humanity of Jesus, his vulnerability, born in a stable and laid on a manger of hay. On Christmas morning the Gospel of John opens with a wonderful poem of praise to Jesus as fully divine, begotten not made, the eternal Word of God, who at a point in time took on our human nature. God became one of us, so that we could become more like God.

The season ends with the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, on January 8.

These weeks are an opportunity to reflect on the difference that the Christian Way can make in our lives, giving a sense of hope and purpose that the world cannot give. Christmas is not just a feast in honour or the baby Jesus, but an invitation to meet the adult Christ, whose presence in our lives is the best present of all, not just at Christmas but throughout the coming year.
