


Parish of Killavullen and Annakisha

1st Reading: Isaiah wrote at a time when Israel was in decline and would soon be militarily defeated. He predicted that the crisis would lead to reform and renewal: A time would come when Israel would again be a light to the nations. 2^{nd} Reading: St Paul would live in Corinth for some time and wrote back to its Christians describing the rich diversity of talents there. He would tell the them to remain focused on Christ, their true source of happiness.

Gospel: John the Baptist recognises Jesus as the "Chosen One" of God: that term is an English translation for "Christ". In him we too become part of God's family.

The Down Survey map of Fermoy Barony, made in the 1650s, shows Monanimy Church and castle on one side of the river and a mill on the other side, where the village is now located. There was no bridge crossing the Blackwater between them at that time. Nor is a bridge mentioned by Charles Smith, in his history of Cork published in 1750; neither is the bridge shown in Taylor and Skinners map of 1777. A ferry must have operated at this time. The present bridge, a tall humpbacked construction, with three wide semicircular arches of striking appearance, is shown in the Ordinance Survey map of 1842. Grove-Whites history of the area, published in 1913 (vol.3, p292) says that the bridge was constructed "not much more than 100 years ago." The bridge, therefore, probably dates to the early 1800s.
