Architect of Killavullen Church: While Killavullen Church was extensively renovated in the 1990s, many of the original features of the 1839 building were

retained, including the east facing façade, the ornate ceiling medallion and mouldings, the two columns and the proscenium arch at the entrance of the sanctuary. The "blind windows" of the façade are typical of the work of Michael Augustine Riordan (1783-1848, pictured). Originally from Doneraile, he joined the Christian Brothers in Cork about the year 1814, and took the name, in religion, "Br. Augustine". In 1826 he joined a Cork-based breakaway that became the Presentation Brothers. He served as the architect of many parish churches in Cork and Kerry, including Doneraile, Ballyhea, Kinsale, Millstreet, Dunmanway, Bantry and Skibbereen Cathedral. The inspiration

he drew from Italian classical architecture is evident in our beautiful parish church.
