Twenty-Fifth Week in Ordinary Time (Sept. 21-28, 2025)

Twenty Fifth Sunday The Lord hears the cry of the oppressed.

First Reading: The prophet Amos preached against the lifestyle of the rich and powerful of his day who were behaving dishonestly. Greed brings much misfortune to humanity, especially to the most vulnerable.

Second Reading: God wants all to be saved. Prayer is the gateway to knowing God's presence. We should pray for others, especially those in authority and try to live a "religious and reverent life in peace and quiet". Gospel: Today's Gospel invites us to reflect on our relationship with money and material wealth. Being wealthy does not guarantee happiness. To make God and God's Kingdom of justice and mercy the focus of our lives is the best way to finding fulfilment. And if we make bad decisions about how to treat others, as the steward does in today's Gospel, we still have the opportunity to put things aright.

This month in parishes throughout Ireland the new Pastoral Letter of the Irish Bishops' Why Sunday Matters, is receiving special attention: from Part Two: Participation (cont.) "Mass is not just a personal act of devotion; it is a communal act of worship. We go to God together. The Sunday Mass is where the Church is most visibly alive, and where every member of the community plays an essential role. Each person's participation is needed for the Church to truly live. It is important to gather physically for Mass, and although technology is helpful, it can never replace the tangible experience of being with the community as we listen to God's word and receive the Body of Christ. We invite you to consider how your presence at Mass can contribute to making the Church visible and alive."

How might we improve our participation at Sunday Mass? Arriving in good time and spending time before Mass in personal prayer certainly helps. Sitting nearer the altar improves our awareness of what's happening. Joining in the singing and the responses of the Mass helps to create community in the assembly; Listening prayerfully to the Word of God and reverently receiving Holy Communion makes the Mass more meaningful.
