Twenty Eighth Sunday Thanksgiving

First Reading: The prophet Elisha heals Naaman, a gentile, of his leprosy, the dreaded skin disease of the ancient world. His healing brings Naaman to belief in the one true God.

Second Reading: Paul writes to Timothy from his prison cell in Rome. He can bear his sufferings with patience and hope because of his faith in Christ.

Gospel: Jesus' reputation as the Messiah grew from events like the healing of the ten lepers. But this healing miracle also serves to make a wider point: that we can all too easily take the gift of life and health for granted. It was a Samaritan, a gentile, who might be regarded as the least deserving of help, who alone returned to give thanks for the gift of salvation.
